2023 - WOW WHAT A YEAR!!

Briefly....In early January we made our first payment on 23-003! Per the purchase contract we put \$2,500 earnest money into an escrow account. February was packed full of events....In December 2022, 23-003 sustained some rudder damage at the hands of hurricane Ian so the owner, Chris Rounds, agreed to allow us to take possession of 23-003, disassemble and ship her to Wichita where we would store her safely indoors, out of the weather, until we could make the final payment. In mid-February, we obtained the original registration number "N200Y" for 23-003 that she wore at her delivery October 13, 1964. The next day, three members of our Board of Directors went to Bartow, FL and, along with several companies who provided in-kind donations of people and equipment, disassembled 23-003 for her trip back home to Wichita. A week later, 23-003 was placed in the exact same place on the ramp in front of building 2 where she stood when delivered in 1964. 24 hours later, CLJF sponsored a 'Welcome Home' event, introducing 23-003 and the CLJF for the first time to the media and visitors. In mid-March we received a very large donation from Brenda Lear, widow of Bill Lear, Jr., to kickoff our first major fundraising project. In April we made a payment of \$15,000 which released the engine log books so overhaul of the engines could begin at International Turbine Industries (ITI). May saw 23-003's fuselage moved from temporary storage into Bombardier Learjet's building 14, the former Learjet Delivery Center. The wing would follow in September. June started with a CLJF booth at the Wichita River Festival's STEM event, followed by two car wash fundraisers. Also in June, the agreement with Bombardier to use part of building 14 to store 23-003 while awaiting our final purchase, was formalized. July saw the CLJF selected as the recipient for the "Wins for Kansas" award of \$500. Primary Acquisition Sponsors Clay Lacy and Lynn Krogh made major donations in mid-July sufficient to 'put us over the top' to allow us to complete the financial acquisition of 23-003. On August 10th CLJF officially owned 23-003! The airplane logbooks arrived in mid-August and their in-depth review started. On October 7th CLJF hosted an Open House and Dinner events to celebrate the 60th anniversary of the first flight of 23-001, the first Learjet. During these events, 45-609, the last Learjet delivered, was parked just outside of the hangar door where 23-003, the first Lear Jet delivered, is being stored. By the





end of November the logbook review was completed and a list of required inspections was prepared. In early December CLJF received the Learjet Data License which will allow us to access the necessary drawings, etc. required for our restoration. . A detailed Inspection/restoration plan is in work and a list of volunteers is being assembled. Hopefully, by the time you read this we will have finalized the lease on a building where the restoration will take place. Stay tuned (and cross your fingers!!)

Around The World Flight to Benefit CLJF

One of our biggest donors, Global Jet Care, based in Brooksville, Florida is planning a flight to circumnavigate the globe to set a new world record in their Learjet model 36A. Global Jet Care is an air ambulance company who operates a fleet of Learjets worldwide. They're doing the flight on behalf of Classic Lear Jet Foundation as a fundraiser for the restoration of Lear Jet 23-003.

The Global Jet Care crew Bart Gray, Joshua Podlich, John Bone, Kirby Ezelle and official witness and CLJF board member Joel Weber plan to depart Wichita flying westbound on April 4, 2024 and return to Wichita on April 6, 2024. The westbound flight into the wind will make stops in California, Hawaii, the Marshall Islands, Palau, Thailand, Pakistan, Egypt, Italy, Portugal and Canada. The arrival back in Wichita on April 6th will coincide with the 100th anniversary of the start of the first ever circumnavigation of the world in an airplane by the U.S. Army Air Service in 1924. The U.S. Army Air Service flight departed Seattle, Washington, and completed the journey 175 days later after making 74 stops. The Global Jet Care Flight in a Learjet model 36A will take approximately 54 hours and 30 minutes to complete.

If you ever study the life of Bill Lear, you will find he didn't need to create this beautiful plane and he didn't need the money, I believe it came down to one my favorite Bill quotes; "They said I'd never build it, that if I built it, it wouldn't fly; that if it flew, I couldn't sell it. Well, I did, and it did, and I could". The Classic Lear Jet Foundation has the same resolve and with the team we have assembled to restore and put this iconic aircraft back in the skies where she belongs, no one is telling us this can't be done!
